CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I - NAME OF THE ORGANIZATION

The name of this organization shall be the Genealogical Association of the Royal Nova Scotia Historical Society, Hereinafter called the Association, and shall be conducted without purpose of gain for its members. Profits and other accretions shall be used to promote its objects.

ARTICLE II - OBJECTS OF THE ASSOCIATION

The objects of the Association shall be to:

- 1) collect and preserve genealogical material;
- 2) promote the study of genealogy and family history in Nova Scotia;
- 3) encourage and instruct people in ethical principles, scientific methods and effective techniques of genealogical research;

- 4) set standards of genealogical practice within Nova Scotia;
- 5) publish and distribute printed and audio-visual genealogical material;
- 6) receive and hold funds for the benefit of the Association.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

- 1) Individual or institutional membership is open to all who support the ethical practice of genealogy in Nova Scotia.
- 2) Membership shall be by calendar year. One who joins after 1 November in any year shall be credited with membership in the calendar year which begins on 1 January next following without further payment.
- 3) Individual members in good standing may attend and vote at meetings of the Association, and are eligible for election to office as hereinafter provided.
- 4) Members in good standing shall receive one copy of each issue of the newsletter.
- 5) Membership may be refused or revoked because of unethical practice of genealogy.
- 6) Council may confer honorary membership to recognize major contributions in the genealogical field, but this does not confer benefits cited in sections 3 and 4 of this Article.

ARTICLE IV - GOVERNMENT

- 1) There shall be a Council containing the officers of the Association and one Councillor elected by each Affiliate as provided hereinafter.
- 2) A Councillor or alternate delegate elected by an Affiliate shall be or at once become a member of the Association, and notify the Recording Secretary within ten days of being elected.
- 3) Each Council member shall have one vote, and the Chair shall have a second casting vote in case of a tie.
- 4) A quorum of Council shall be one more than half the number of officers, and never less than six.
- 5) Council shall meet at least twice a year to receive reports, discuss and direct the Association's business. One meeting shall be one month prior to the Annual General Meeting (AGM) in order to arrange business and draw up an agenda.
- 6) Council shall exercise such powers as are or may be conferred upon it by these by-laws or any general meeting of the Association. Officers shall function as an Executive Committee between general meetings.
- 7) A Councillor who fails to attend any Council meeting for a period of one year without a valid reason is deemed to have resigned. The Chair may fill any vacancy which occurs among the officers. Such appointees shall serve until the next AGM.

ARTICLE V - GENERAL MEETINGS

- 1) Officers shall be elected at an AGM. During their term in office the officers are all exempt from paying dues, unless they wish to pay.
- 2) The term of all officers shall be three years. Times served as an acting officer shall not be counted as part of such a term.
- 3) Officers may be re-elected to an additional term of two years, but no person may continue in the same office for more than five consecutive years, except with the unanimous consent of an AGM.
- 4) Officers' terms begin at the end of the AGM at which they are elected and conclude at the end of the AGM which elects their successors.
- 5) The officers of the Association shall be as follows:

a) Chairman	e) Treasurer	i) Distribution Secretary
b) Vice-Chairman	f) Queries Editor	j) Affiliates Coordinator
c) Editor	g) Recording Secretary	
d) Membership Secretary	h) Publications Secretary	
- 6) The CHAIRMAN is the main executive officer, being responsible for the general supervision of the Association's affairs; presiding at Council and Association meetings; and heading the Planning Committee.
- 7) The VICE-CHAIRMAN deputizes as required by the Chairman, serves on the Planning Committee, and heads the Programme Committee.
- 8) The EDITOR is responsible for the overall operation of a newsletter; heads the Editorial Committee, and coordinates preparation and printing of the newsletter.
- 9) The MEMBERSHIP SECRETARY leads the Membership Committee maintains membership and

- mailing lists; supplies a copy to the Distribution Secretary.
- 10)The TREASURER shall safeguard the Association's funds and maintain adequate financial records; deposit all monies received and recommend investments of surplus funds to Council, and prepare a financial report for the AGM.
 - 11)The QUERIES EDITOR receives and prepares queries and replies for the newsletter; and serves on the Editorial Committee.
 - 12)The RECORDING SECRETARY keeps minutes of meetings, prepares agenda and notifies members of meetings; serves on the Programme Committee. In case of absence, this officer shall provide a substitute.
 - 13)The PUBLICATIONS SECRETARY shall be responsible for back issues and publications exchanges; serves on the Editorial Committee; and report on sales of the Association's occasional publications and recommends a publication schedule for forthcoming numbers.
 - 14)The DISTRIBUTION SECRETARY prepares newsletters for mailing and supervises meetings of members to help in doing so. This officer is a member of the Membership Committee.
 - 15)The AFFILIATES COORDINATOR acts as liason between the Association and its Affiliates; maintains a list of regional consultants for publication in the newsletter. Serves on the Membership Committee.

ARTICLE VII - AFFILIATION

- 1)Any fifteen or more members of the Association may apply for Affiliate status. Applicants within Nova Scotia shall define the area within which they propose to operate, and state the name by which they will be known. No Affiliate shall be recognized if it be situate within ten miles (16 km) of another, unless each group has a minimum of twenty members. Each Affiliate shall pay an unrefundable registration fee and an annual token sum to keep their name on the books as an Affiliate. Association or Affiliate may terminate their connection upon six months notice, or should one or other cease to operate. Each Affiliate shall elect a Councillor and an alternate delegate, subject to the same length of term as the officers of the Association.
- 2)Affiliates plan their own activities and publications, but shall conform to the general objects of the Association. Property and funds of Affiliates remain entirely their own.
- 3)Affiliates shall provide the Association with one free copy of each newsletter or publication they produce. These become the property of the Association and shall be deposited as Council instructs.
- 4)Affiliates shall receive one free copy of each newsletter of the Association over and above copies ordered by their members as individuals.

ARTICLE VIII- DUES

- 1)Council shall set annual dues which become payable on 1 January in each calendar year. Dues not paid by 1 May shall result in removal of the defaulting member from membership without further notice.
- 2)A member resumes good standing on payment of arrears or by rejoining. Each member is responsible for advising the Association promptly of any changes in address.
- 3)Resignation or death of a member does not result in refund of dues that have been received and deposited to the Association's account.

ARTICLE IX - EXECUTION OF INSTRUMENTS

- 1)Any cheque, draft or bill exchange shall be signed on behalf of the Association by the Chairman and the Treasurer.
- 2)Such instruments payable to the Association may be endorsed by either of the foregoing.

ARTICLE X - COMMITTEES

- 1)Council may create, enlarge, reduce or discontinue any committee at its sole discretion. Each standing committee shall have its terms of reference. Committee chairmen shall make reports to the AGM, submitting a copy beforehand to the Chairman and Recording Secretary. Council may allow standing committees power to add up to three members.
- 2)The PLANNING COMMITTEE (Chairman, Vice-Chairman, etc) considers new projects and adaptations of existing operations.

- 3)The PROGRAMME COMMITTEE (Vice-Chairman,Recording Secretary,etc) plans workshops, and arranges Association participation in the activities of other organizations
- 4)The EDITORIAL COMMITTEE (Editor,Queries Editor, Publications Secretary) is concerned with the content and publication of the newsletter.
- 5)The MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE (Membership and Distribution **Secretaries**, and Affiliates Coordinator) maintain and provide current membership lists.
- 6)Ad hoc committees shall be appointed as and when required.

ARTICLE XII - DISSOLUTION

In the event of the dissolution of this Association, its **remaining** assets and liabilities shall be transferred to the Royal Nova Scotia Historical Society.

ARTICLE XIII - ENABLING

- 1)These by-laws or their adopted form after a founding meeting shall have effect the day of their adoption.
- 2)For purposes of tenure, officers shall be deemed to have taken office as of 1982 AGM, and shall remain in office, if they are able and willing, until the 1985 AGM.

FEES:- The existing fee structure is herewith abolished. Membership is henceforth by calendar year. If you are a subscriber, your membership will be carried until the year to which you were paid up. Hereafter, membership must be renewed every year. Existing members who expire in 1982 should renew by 1 May 1983 or their membership will lapse without further notice. New members who join until 1 November 1982 will be considered members from 1 January 1982 and receive the entire year's newsletters. New members joining after that will be considered members from 1 January 1983 and begin to receive newsletters with the first issue of that year. Dues until 1 November 1982 remain \$8.00 per year, and rise then to \$10.00 per year. Americans pay in U.S. funds, Canadians in Canadian money. The exchange covers the higher postal costs of mailings to the United States.

Queries cost members \$1.00, non-members \$2.00 each. Requests for general information about a family will be treated as an advertisement and be bought at \$6.00 per column inch (\$7.00 to non-members). Your attention to these details will be greatly appreciated. Thanks!

At Halifax, N.S., Died March 28,1893, John William Marvin, in the 68 year of his age, at No. 28, Bland Street, N.S.

At Windsor, died Sept. 16th. 1895, Harriet E. Marvin, in the 61st. year of her age.

Died at Halifax, May 27th. 1908, Margaret E. wife of James Crawford, aged 81 years.

Died at Los Angelos Cal. Dec. 2, 1912, Edward B. Marvin, aged 81 years.

Died at Windsor, N.S. March 13th. 1915. Jane H. Worthylake, aged 82 years.

Jane Harriet, wife of William H. Marvin, departed this life July 16th. 1840. Happy in death. Aged 40 years.

BOOK REVIEWS

Angus Baxter, In Search of Your British and Irish Roots. Macmillan of Canada, 70 Bond St., Toronto, Ontario M5B 1X3. Price \$17.95. xiv + 304 pp., indexed.

As one of the thousands who enjoyed and appreciated Colonel Baxter's In Search of Your Roots, I expected great things again and was not dissatisfied. Baxter combines thoroughness with a dept personal touch which sustains reader interest. Topics include starting a family tree, searching abroad, adoptions, Jewish and Mormon records, five chapters on English and Welsh records, one each on Scotland, Ireland and the lesser islands and concluding sections about preparing the family history and the endless nature of the genealogical quest.

Necessarily, much of what Baxter has to say has been said before. He writes for the family historian who may have no prior experience at genealogy. Many will read only one book, so an author is constrained to ensure that if that one be his book, it shall give as much help as possible.

Apart from the general information, Baxter takes each English county and tells its societies, which parish registers are held in the county record office, marriage licences wills, census returns, etc. The other parts of the British Isles are handled entire: Ireland, Ulster, Scotland, Isle of Man, Channel Islands.

When facts have been checked and evidence weighed, the genealogist should feel the wonder and exhilaration Baxter did when he found a beam with JB and IB 1539 carved around a heart pierced by Cupid's arrow. Even if your ancestry in Britain does not trace back four and a half centuries, your attempts to reach that goal will be assisted if you read and digest this book. Both for the family historian who will go to Britain and conduct his own search and for the amateur who wants to direct intelligent questions to hired researchers in Britain, this book throws out a lifeline. Grasp it!

Douglas Eaton Eagles, Eagles Families of North America. Available from the author, 285 College Avenue North, Sarnia, Ontario N7T 6B9. Price \$15.00 (US \$14.00) 8" X 11". Figures, indexed, iv + 140 pp.

Mr. Eagles, author of "A genealogical History of Long Island (North Grand Pre), Kings County, N.S.", is to be commended on the approach he uses in this attractive new book. Instead of tracing the one Eagles family, he covers a great number of apparently unconnected families. The result is a much more complete treatment of a Nova Scotian surname. As some of the smaller groups would not merit a book, Doug Eagles has performed a useful service to all.

There are seventeen Eagles families included, accounting for 280 family groups treated according to the New England method of presentation. The indexes contain above 2500 names, and there is significant information on people named Allen, Baker, Bishop, Campbell, Cochrane, Coldwell, David, Davison, Hicks, Killam, Lawrence, Lewis, Moore, Porter, Power, Rogers, Rushton, Schofield, Scott, Thompson and Wilson.

Another plus in this book is Mr. Eagles generous use of anecdotal material to enable us to understand the people and their times. The account of the mining and smelting at Londonderry Mines is a personal vignette of industry years ago (p.44), while the reader will smile at the howlers from Bill Eagles' scrapbook (p.31). If, like this reviewer, you are captivated by strange name usage, you will add to your list these two from the Eagles of America: a girl christened "Weighty" (p.66) which makes one wonder at the reason for such a choice; and "Zoe" used as a man's name (p. 32), certainly not the usual sexual identification of Zoes. This is another in a series of excellent productions from Doug Eagles, one of Nova Scotia's more active non-resident family historians.

Harry R. Brown et al, Lore of North Cumberland. Published by the North Cumberland Historical Society, Box 52, Pugwash, N.S. BOK 1L0. \$6.00.

The North Cumberland group had the late Harry Brown as its heart and soul for many years. We are fortunate indeed that Harry's friends included John R. MacQuarrie, author of Malagash Salt (recently re-issued in a revised edition for \$6.00; available same address). John is no mean local historian and genealogist himself, and brings a great deal of sensitivity to the task of completing a book that Harry Brown had conceived and had hoped to write. This book of 212 pages stands as a monument to both men, the beginner and the continuer.

More than one hundred and twenty tales, poems, letters and newspaper items make up the collection. Folklore abounds and a list of old-time remedies appears on pages 13-15. A sizeable section of verse by the late R.C. Swallow is collected herein (pages 90-114). If you collect prices from bygone days, you may appreciate the store accounts on page 35. Chronologically the book ranges over many years and periods, from Mary Graham, Loyalist (pages 11-12) to a good short account of the United Farmers Party of Nova Scotia, 1919-1925 (pages 63-67).

1783, January 31 after a 3 times proclamation was married and blessed Johann Adam Heeb, legal son of the deceased Wendel Heeb, citizen of Mangelbach and Anna Margaretha, daughter of the deceased Johann Adam Franck, citizen of Huffenhart.

1783, August 14, 2 pm was born to Johann Adam Heeb, joint-owner of the saw-mill in Falkengasab and his wife, with who he had slept together 3½ months to early, Anna Margaretha a son and bapti 17. Godfather was the legal son of Johann Peter Braner, taylor in Falkengasab and gave him the name Johann Adam.

1739, January 31 in the morning 11 h was found under the wheel of the saw-mill and it is supposed he wanted to sharpen the axe of the saw-mill and fallen into the wheel - Johann Adam Heeb son in law of the saw-miller of Falkengasab and was burried on February 2, his age was 27 years.

Johann Adam Eisenhauer of Eisenbach married Johann Adam Heeb's widow, Anna Margaretha in 1784. Eisenhauer went to North America in 1751.

No. 36 - Q1830: WRIGHT According to Thomas Miller's Historical and Genealogical Record of the first settlers of Colchester County (Mika Reprint;1972), Mary Ann Wright was the daughter of Ephraim and Mary (Blachford) Wright. She had two sisters, Sarah and Elizabeth and three brothers James, Robert and Daniel. Ephraim Wright was the seventh son of James and Deborah (Howard) Wright. James was one of the grantees of Truro Township and Deborah was a grantee of Onslow Twmsp. Further information about Deborah Howard's family can be found in the genealogy of the Frame family by Christina Ross Fame.-----M. E. WRIGHT-----

No.36 -Q1804. POWER. My data on Gideon Power is limited, but his wife's family is recorded (p.51) as is her marriage (p.111) in "The Nova Scotia Eatons" by Charles Ernest Eaton printed 1979 by the author.(Box 160, RR#2, Wolfville, N.S. BOP 1X0). In Kings Co, Administrations (p.53), I found Gideon Power, 1899 -(his death is

given as 2 Apr. 1899), Cornwallis West, farmer. His widow was Sarah L. Power and and his oldest son was Rufus G. Power----- MR. PHILLIP THORPE-----

No. 36 - Q1806. POWER. I do not have the answer to your question. I do have information from the Will of William Power's father. Patrick Power wrote a will on the 30th day of July 1811 and died before 13 Nov. 1811. In his will he names his wife Hannah, sons William, Edward and Atwell; and daughters Mary, wife of Henry Alkinson; Sarah, single; and Jane, wife of Simon Porter (Loose wills P9, Court of Probate, County of Kings, Kentville, N.S.). The same Source (Administrations P33) identifies the descendants of William's brother Edward in 1873. No.36 - Q1721.BALCOM. From the 1871 Census - Reuben Balcom age 60, his wife Dorcas, age 53; children - Albert age 22, Harriet age 24, Norman age 18, Elmira age 15, George age 12. From Calnek p.469, Reuben Balcom b. 1772 m. 1796 Phoebe Messenger. Norman J. Balcom Lawrencetown m. Eudora Balcom of Williamston at Nictaux, 14 Sept. 1882 (Christian Messenger 18 Oct. 1882) -----VERNON M. SPURR

No.36 - Q1802.PHINNEY. The information actually required was who were the parents of D'arcy Phinney. From marriages solemnized in Annapolis Co. (1865 p.9 No.71) m. at Wilmot, 11 Oct. 1865, D'arcy Phinney age 23, b. Forest Glen, son of Stephen and Jane Phinney to Lavinia Harris, b. Margaretville, dau of David and Eliza Harris. In the 1871 Census, D'arcy Phinney is listed as age 29 and Lavinia as age 24 and two children, Charles age 3 and Georgina 9/12 July. D'arcy's father Stephen Phinney d. 8 July 1860 and his mother Jane d. 7 May 1865. Both were buried at Middleton, Ann. Co., N.S. Suggested ref. for Phinney family in Genealogiae by A.M. Inglis Morse, published 1925. -----VERNON M. SPURR

No.36 - Q1741.DOLLIVER/ANNIS. I suggest the two following sources: History of Brooklyn by Lucius D. Dexter (1933; a copy is at Acadia University Library, Wolfville, N.S.). It contains a large quantity of material including descendants of James Annis (d. 9 June 1840 ae. 78 yrs.) Also The Diary of Joseph Dimock (Edited by G. Levy -d. 1871) published 1979 by Lancelot Press, Hantsport, N.S.; diary includes a number of marriages among which occur some Dollivers. According to Dexter, James Annis Sr, (b/Cape Cod, Mass., s/o Thomas and Lydia Annis of Barnstable, Mass.; d.1840)m. Lydia, d/o Benjamin and Bathsheba Holmes, in Queens Co., N.S. Resided at Great Hill. Lydia was b. 26 Oct. 1772 - d. 18 Mar. 1850. Their children - Benjamin b. 1791; Joseph b. 1799; George b. 1804; Frances b. 1801 (son); Deane b. 1810; Lydia b. 1812; Rebecca b. 1807. All were married except George d.y.) Lydia m. Cornelius Uhlman.-----ALLEN B. ROBERTSON-----

No. 37 - Q1870. MACDONALD. Parents of William Dickson MacDonald were Henry and Ruby MacDonald. According to 1871 Census for Kings Co. Div. F2 Canning; Henry was 48 yrs. old and W. Methodist religion, origin Scotch and occupation mariner. Ruby was age 42, same religion, origin English, both b. in N.S. Wm. Dickson was b. 24 Sept. 1852, d. 9 Nov. 1934. He was buried in Union Church of Scots Bay Cemetery - Kings co., N.S. (Apparently went by the name of Dickson) -----MR. PHILLIP THORPE -----

No.37 - Q1891.THORPE. Sarah Thorpe b..11 Aug. 1841, d. 29 Nov. 1939. She m. 10 Mar.1858 to Judah Wells Steele and not Samuel Steele. She m. a 2nd time to Wilfred Wheaton 8 May 1907. Information found in the Canning Methodist Church Register and the Marriage Register (P.A.N.S.) for 1907, #33,p.110. -----MR. PHILLIP THORPE-----

No.38. Q1904.BAUER/BOWER. Johann Jacob Bauer's wife was Hanna Margaretha Engel. She was buried in Dec. 1806 age 86 (Lunenburg Reformed Church Records), and was then a widow. -----TERRENCE M. PUNCH -----

No.38.Q1930. GILFOY. Thomas Gilfoy (sometimes recorded as Kilfoil) and wife, Mary Flinn, had four children baptised on Halifax in the 1820's and appear to have had three children when they came to Halifax ca. 1820. Thomas died in 1861 age 70; his widow

Mary, died in 1870 age 79. Both are buried at Holy Cross Cemetery, Halifax. --T.M.P.

No.38, Q1931GILFOY. John Gilfoy, father of Vincent Patrick, was born in Halifax, son of John and Catherine Gilfoy. -----T.M.P.-----

No.38.Q1938. HARVEY. Susannah, wife of John Michael Harvey, was a daughter of James and Barbara Coxwell, and is mentioned in the Will of James dated 19 Feb. 1800 (Halifax County Will Book III, pp. 267,378). Reasoning supporting this identification appears in reply to query 49, and published in the Newsletter of the South Shore Genealogical Society for July-August 1982.-----T.M.P.

No.38.Q1994 SARSFIELD . Edward Walsh from Co.Tipperary married in 1839 (Halifax RC) Bridget, dau. of Patrick and Ellen (Beresford) Sarsfield of Waterford. This doesn't answer the query, but does show a member of that Sarsfield family in N.S. ca. 1840 as queried. -----T.M.P.-----

No.38.Q2001. STEVENS. See The Stevens Families of Nova Scotia, by R. Kim Stevens and Cj Stevens, pp. 343 - 344. -----T.M.P.-----

No.38.Q2012.VAN MALDER. Dominick Volmander of Brussels married in 1826 (Halifax RC) Clara Ann, dau. of John Keatly of Halifax. This supports the theory of Belgian origin mentioned in the query. As certain baptism records make plain the man was Dominick Nicholas Valmalder. Nova Scotia Despatches, Vol.82, dated 22 Sept. 1843, contain information about one Nicholas VonMalden, in Halifax ca. 1822, as requested by the Belgian minister at London. These references would probably be relevant to the enquiry at hand. -----T.M.P.-----
